2. History of building

2.1 original brief/purpose

Designed in 1964, the church is the result of a long research that had started a decade earlier, when Figini and Pollini were busy designing other religious building (Madonna dei Poveri church).

3. Description

3.1 general description

Built ten years after the church of the Madonna dei Poveri in Baggio, the church of Giovanni e Paolo Saints has a different architectural style to the previous experience.

While the church in Baggio has no recognisable exterior form, becoming pure matter and light on the inside, the church of 1964 is a continuous articulation of forms and overlapping masses. The exterior is architecturally complex. Main walls built of bricks open and close around the liturgical spaces in an articulate progression of continuous recesses and protrusions which respond to the need to characterise the interior spaces. The exterior volume is closed by a very compact wall standing two metres tall which isolates the complex from the road, creating a 'holy enclosure' inside which a system of steps and terraces is arranged, with gardens and clearings set on different levels. The ecclesial enclosure is divided into two segments: the assembly hall and the 'parochial works', separated by a garden which the designers referred to as *Hortus conclusus*. The two parts are connected by a loggia.

3.2 construction

The church is a continuous articulation of forms and overlapping masses: the exterior is architecturally complex. Main walls built of bricks open and close around the liturgical spaces in an articulate progression of continuous recesses and protrusions which respond to the need to characterise the interior spaces.

3.3 context

Tackling the issue of designing a place of worship immersed in a contemporary town, the two architects chose to build a quiet place, well isolated from the outside world, where, without resorting to artificially charming and intimist atmospheres, churchgoers can pray, remain silent and meditate. This ecclesiastical complex occupies a trapezoidal plot on the northern periphery of Milan. The exterior volume is closed by a very compact wall standing two metres tall which isolates the complex from the road.

4 Evaluation

4.1 technical

The 'free' plan shows an organic distribution of the spaces, where paths and rest areas lie close to one another, and form an overall strongly characterized by the steady relationship among individual parts, and between these and the outside. The plan is based on the repetition of the Greek cross and reveals a meticulous study of the distribution of the independent but closely linked spaces.

At first glance, the architecture seems not to respond to the severity with which Figini and Pollini built their architectural language. In actual fact we can see a strong sense of symmetry both in the plan and the prospects.
